Advanced Placement (AP) Report, 2013–2014

Introduction

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The district's Advanced Placement (AP) program consists of college-level courses taught by its high schools and corresponding end-of-course examinations administered by the College Board in May of each year. District high school principals are responsible for ensuring that the AP courses taught at their schools are authorized at the teacher level through the College Board's annual AP Course Audit process. Most colleges and universities grant credit, placement, or both to students receiving a qualifying score on an AP exam, usually 3 or higher on a 5-point scale.

Since the AP program is primarily designed for students in Grades 10 to 12,¹ this report focuses on these grade levels at district-managed schools and includes only results of exams taken in conjunction with the appropriate district AP coursework. Four district charter schools—Gompers Preparatory Academy, King-Chavez High, Preuss, and O'Farrell—offered AP programs in 2013–14. Reports that include charter data are at www.sandi.net/research.

Student Participation and Performance




Figure 1. Student participation and performance in the AP program.

Figure 1 shows an increase in district student participation in the AP program for 2014. This is based on the proportion of all students in grades 10 to 12 who enrolled in at least one AP course (37 percent) and took at least one AP exam (29 percent). The proportion of all students passing at least one AP exam also increased (18 percent), although later it will be noted that the proportion of AP exams with passing scores declined slightly compared with 2013.

Sizable gains in exam participation in 2009 and 2010 followed by a sharp decline in 2011 were due largely to the introduction and subsequent discontinuation after two years of the district AP exam fee subsidy program. To compensate for the subsidy

loss, the district no longer requires students to take an AP exam to receive weighted course credit.² All students now receive weighted credit for every AP course whether or not the corresponding AP exam is taken. This may explain why course participation was not adversely affected by the subsidy loss. It is notable that exam participation rates after the subsidy ended remain higher than rates before the subsidy years.

Courses and Examinations

The College Board's 2014 AP program included 34 exams with corresponding courses in these subject areas: Arts, English, History and Social Sciences, Mathematics and Computer Science, Sciences, and World Language; district students took 30 of these courses/exams.³ Individual district schools offered up to 23 AP courses, with 13 of 28 of




Figure 2. Number of AP courses offered at non-alternative district-managed schools, 2014.




Figure 4. Exam pass rate (passing score is at least 3 on a 5-point scale).




Figure 3. Number of AP course enrollments and exams taken and passed.

District students did not take the following AP exams in conjunction with an appropriate district AP course: Chinese Language and Culture, German Language and Culture, Italian Language and Culture, and Japanese Language and Culture. A few district students took the Chinese and Japanese AP exams but without the corresponding AP district coursework.

non-alternative schools offering 11 or more AP courses (Figure 2). In 2014, there were modest increases in AP course enrollment and exam counts—12,814 course enrollments and 9,874 exams,⁴ up from 12,590 course enrollments and 9,642 exams in 2012 (Figure 3). The exam pass rate continues its upward trend—58 percent in 2013 compared with 57 percent for 2012, yet another record-high pass rate (Figure 4).

AP Program for Students in Grades 8 and 9. A few district high schools allow selected Grade 9 students limited participation in their AP programs. In 2014, 189 Grade 9 students at district-managed schools took 195 AP exams with appropriate AP coursework—81 percent of the students were from Mira Mesa and Point Loma high schools; 158 of the 195 exams taken were in Human Geography. Grade 9 students earned passing scores on 99 of the 195 AP exams taken.

Consistent with College Board policy on middle school students and AP world lan-

guage exams, selected Grade 8 students at Language Academy and Longfellow passed 40 of 48 AP Spanish Language exams; selected Grade 8 students at Language Academy passed 16 of 19 AP French Language exams.

Participation and Performance by Student Group

Nearly all student groups experienced gains in AP course participation rates (Tables 1 and 3). The two exceptions were the Asian student group, which experienced a minimal decline, and student with disabilities, whose rate remained unchanged. For exam pass rates, results were mixed—non-meal eligible, African American, Asian, Filipino, Pacific Islander, Filipino, English Fluent, and GATE-identified students experienced rate gains, while most of the remaining groups experienced rate declines with the exception of White, meal-eligible, and non-GATE students whose exam pass rates stayed the same. Results for Native American and Pacific Islander groups should be interpreted with caution due to their relatively small group size, which often result in large rate fluctuations from year to year.




Figure 5. Course participation by selected student group.

Among the larger racial/ethnic groups, Asian students had the highest course participation and exam pass rates; African American students had the lowest. Similar to other assessments, gaps in AP participation and performance persist. Wide gaps persist between White students and African American students and between non-meal eligible and meal eligible students (Figures 5 and 6). Former English learner students who have already been reclassified to fluent status continue to have lower pass rates than their initially fluent counterparts. Not surprisingly, of all student groups, English learner students have the lowest AP exam pass rate; they also have the second lowest AP course participation rate next to students with disabilities.

Students in Grades 10 to 12 at district-managed schools took 385 AP exams without the corresponding district AP course.

Figure 6. Exam pass rate by selected student group.



Exam Results by Subject Area

The College Board reports AP participation and performance in terms of percentages of <u>all</u> graduates who have taken and passed an AP exam at any time during their high school years. The most recent data available is for 2013 and mirror those from previous years, with district graduates outperforming graduates from public schools across the nation and in California (Figure 7). However, if the percentages of graduates who passed at least one AP exam were computed using only those graduates who took an AP exam as denominator instead of all graduates, California graduates appear to have greater success on the AP exams than their counterparts in the district and nation—66 percent for California compared with 62 for the district and 61 for the nation.
